ADDRESS OF GRAND HIGH PRIEST.

To the Officers and Members of the Grand Royal Arch Chapter of New Brunswick:

Excellent Companions:—Another year has gone to join its fellows of the past. The Grand Architect of the Universe has graciously spared us another year. Let us lift our hearts in thankfulness to Him for the manifold

blessings bestowed upon us.

It is with a feeling of deep responsibility that I greet you on this, the occasion of our Forty-fifth Annual Convocation. This Convocation will demand of each of you your best thought and deliberation, for what we do here will not be limited in its results to an hour or a day but will affect the welfare of Capitular Masonry in New Brunswick for the ages that are to come.

In rendering you an account of my stewardship I am deeply conscious of the fact that out of the abundant field of golden opportunity I have gathered so few of the

ripened sheaves of enduring accomplishment.

We are here, my Companions, to look back over the span of one year and to look forward into the future and to try and so plan that the mistakes of the past will but spur us on to greater accomplishments in the days to come. Yesterday is gone forever; tomorrow is but around the turn of the road. To-day is ours to use wisely.

NECROLOGY.

The seythe of time has again been active among our ranks, removing from our midst Companions of sterling worth, who have labored diligently and earnestly for the welfare of the Craft in general. They have been called from this vale of tears and summoned, before the Grand Chapter above to receive their just reward and abide in that Celestial Conclave where the wicked cease from troubling and the weary shall find rest.

Our Official Family has been visited on three occasions. Right Excellent Companion Peter Campbell, Grand Treasurer, passed through the Fourth Veil into the presence of the EternalCouncil on February 16th, 1932. Our departed Companion, being of a very modest and retiring disposition in Masonic circles, I cannot record his Masonic history except to state that he was the oldest member of Carleton Chapter, No. 1, Saint John, and honored this Grand Chapter by occupying the office of Grand Treasurer for the past twenty-two years, giving to that office, at all times, exceptional care and attention. He was the Representative of the Grand Chapter of Rhode Island near the Grand Chapter of New Brunswick.

Right Excellent Companion the Venerable Archdeacon Newnham died very suddenly at his home in Saint Stephen on May 11th, 1932. He was born and educated in Eng-While preparing for his life work as a clergyman of the Anglican Church, he was attached to the Seaman's Mission, Lisbon, Portugal, and, while there, was made a Mason in 1874, in a Lodge called the Lodge of Regeneration, originally under the Grand Lodge of Ireland. He received ten degrees in the rite as practiced there at that time, including the Royal Arch. He affiliated with Zetland Lodge, No. 24, Shediae, from which he transferred his membership to Sussex Lodge (Saint Stephen) in 1889 and joined Saint Stephen Royal Arch Chapter about the same time. He was a Past Master of Sussex Lodge, No. 7. Past Grand Chaplain of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, Past High Priest of St. Stephen Chapter, Past Grand Scribe of the Grand Royal Arch Chapter of New Brunswick and, at the time of his death, was the Representative of the Grand Chapter of New South Wales near the Grand Chapter of New Brunswick.

April 15th, 1932, there departed this life Right Excellent Companion Wm. J. McClaverty, Saint John. He was a member of the different Masonic Orders and gave unsparingly of his time and energy to assist and advance the welfarel of Freemasonry. He was a member of Saint John's Lodge, No. 2, Past High Priest of Carleton Chapter, No. 1, Past Grand King of the Grand Royal Arch Chapter of New Brunswick and Representative of the Grand Chapter of Montana near the Grand Chapter of New Brunswick.

Our hearts go out in sympathy to the Chapters and bereaved families of our late Companions. "To live in the hearts of those we leave behind is not to die."

I have no records of others of our Companions who may have been called to the Great Beyond, during the past year, but would suggest that one or more pages of our Annual Proceedings be given to the memory of the departed.

COMMISSIONS.

During the year I have issued Commissions to Representatives of the Grand Chapter of New Brunswick near Sister Grand Chapters and have recommended several Excellent Companions as Representatives of Sister Grand Chapters near the Grand Chapter of New Brunswick. These will be enumerated by the Grand Secretary in his report.

These latter Companions join with those previously appointed in forming a definite link between our Grand Chapter and our Companions of the Sister Grand Chapters throughout the world. The duties of holding these commissions are not arduous, but the necessity of attending to them promptly is none the less important. I would suggest that each of you who have been appointed to the position as Grand Representative will attend to the duty of writing to the Grand High Priest or Grand Secretary of the Grand Jurisdiction which you represent, very shortly after you have returned home, giving them a report of our deliberations here to-day and the fraternal greetings of their Companions in New Brunswick.

DECISIONS.

I am very glad to say that no matters requiring a decision have been referred to me. Several inquiries have been received relative to difficulties that have arisen, from time to time, in the interpretation of the new ritual and these I have answered to the best of my limited ability.

VISITATIONS.

I had great pleasure in making the following visits:
On October 15th, accompanied by Most Ex. Comp.
George Ackman, Right Ex. Comp. G. Fred Knight and S.
Gordon Hopper, Very Ex. Comps. J. Walter McFarlane
and Heber A. Carson; Ex. Comps. T. R. Campbell, A. C.
Wilbur, M. C. Horner and C. C. Ehrahardt, I visited Walton Chapter, Salisbury. We were received with the
Grand Honours, and the Royal Arch Degree was conferred in a very creditable manner. Considering that
this Chapter was instituted less than two years ago, the
High Priest and Officers have shown wonderful progress.
From the excellence of their work, I predict for them very
bright and prosperous years to come.

I am deeply indebted to the Officers and Companions who came out from Moneton and assisted to make this

visit a success.

On October 16th, accompanied by Right Ex. Comp. G. Fred Knight, Grand King; Very Ex.Companions G. Walter McFarlane, Grand Captain of the Host; Dugald C. Firth, Charles A. Alexander, C. Homer Mathews, John F. Goss and Wm. J. Gillis, I visited Campbellton Chapter. We were welcomed by the Ex. High Priest, Edward A. LeGallais, who, with the assistance of his officers, conferred the Mark Master Mason Degree in a most able manner, thus upholding the reputation of this Chapter for

its splendid work.

On November 4th, accompanied by Right Ex. Comp. S. D. Heekbert, Ex. Companions Fred M. Tweedie, H. H. Simonds, J. Murray Tweedie, F. Arthur McKenzie, G. P. Stewart, W. B. Snowball and J. E. Dickison, I visited Mount Lebanon Chapter, Chatham. We were very cordially welcomed by the Ex. High Priest, F. P. Heckbert, Officers and members of the Chapter. Because of the continued wet weather, the candidate, who was motoring from Halifax, failed to arrive; as well as a large number, including several officers, from Bathurst. Degree work was therefore dispensed with and I remained in for the closing. Judging from the efficient manner in which

these latter exercises were carried out, I have full confidence that the officers of Mount Lebanon Chapter are

well up in the vanguard in their ritualistic work.

On November 16th, accompanied by Most Ex. Comps. Dr. J. J. Daley and Samuel J. Parkhill, Right Ex. Comps. Albert C. Lemmon and G. Fred Knight, Very Ex. Comp. A. C. Gorham, Excellent Companions Harry H. Reid, W. Clark Elliot, Ralph T. Pearson and Wm. P. Erb, I visited Sussex Chapter, No. 9. We were very graciously welcomed and received, and the Excellent High Priest, W. Alward King, with his very efficient staff of officers, exemplified the Mark Master Mason Degree in a very perfect manner, the floor work of the Marshal and Overseers being especially noticeable.

November 27th, accompanied by Ex. Companions Rev. N. Franchetti, Adam S. McKinley and Charles M. Rideout, visited Edmundston Chapter. We were hospitably received by the Ex. High Priest, Malcolm E. Amos, Officers and Companions. The Royal Arch Degree was conferred in a very excellent manner, which showed attentive work and preparation by the officers. The attendance was large, considering that the members of this Chapter are scattered throughout the three north-western Counties of

the Province.

January 18th, 1932, accompanied by V.E. Companions S. Gordon Hopper, Grand Superintendent District No. 2; Harry Hiett, Grand Pursuivant; J. H. Henry and A. C. Gorham, Ex. Companions Thomas R. Campbell, J. H. McAfee, L. T. Leaman and W. A. King, I visited Botsford Chapter, Moncton. We were received with the Grand Honours, and the Holy Royal Arch Degree was conferred, under the new ritual, by the High Priest, R.E. Companion G. Fred Knight and Officers in a very impressive manner. All officers, although conferring this degree for the first time, performed their ritualistic work in a very perfect manner and, with a Chapter Orchestra in attendance, this degree was conferred in fully as impressive and perfect a manner as that exemplified by our esteemed Companious from Carnarvan Chapter last June. It was noticeable that

several Past High Priests assisted in the lectures, thus showing that, with this new ritual, the Chapters have a splendid opportunity to interest the Past High Priests and thus maintain their active interest in the Chapter work.

April 19th, accompanied by M.E. Companion S. J. Parkhill, R.E. Comps. A. C. Lemmon and J. W. Duncan, V.E. Comps. C. L. Jenkins and W. S. Keir, I visited Union Chapter, No. 4, West Saint John. The Mark Master Mason Degree was conferred in a very impressive manner by Past High Priest Wm. Cooper and his officers, the High Priest, unfortunately, being unable to attend. This Chapter has not, as yet, commenced work under the new ritual, but expect to do so after the Summer vacation. The Convocation was enthusiastic and I greatly enjoyed my visit.

April 21st, accompanied by M.E. Companions G. L. Williams, Past Grand High Priest of Nova Scotia, and Samuel J. Parkhill, R.E. Companions A. C. Lemmon, J. Herbert Crockett, J. Fred Knight and J. W. Duncan, V.E. Companions W. H. B. Sadlier, C. Leonard Jenkins, James S. Hoyt, District Grand Superintendent; G. C. Cosman, Percy E. Speer and Harry T. Dakin, I visited Carleton Chapter, No. 1, Saint John. We were received with the Grand Honours by the Excellent 1st Principal, Ex. Comp. Thomas G. Ballantyne, Officers and Companions and, after being escorted to the East, our distinguished visitor, M.E. Companion Williams, was also accorded Grand Honours and escorted to the East. The Mark Master Mason Degree was conferred, with the Ex. Companion 3rd Principal, A. C. W. Parlee in the Chair. This being the first time this degree was conferred under the new ritual, the very impressive and perfect manner in which the ritualistic work was rendered showed careful and intensive preparation by the officers. Instructive and interesting addresses were delivered by several of the Companions, including Ex. Companion W. H. B. Sadlier, the oldest living Excellent Companion and the only Past Z. of Carleton Chapter. The attendance was good and showed Carleton Chapter to be in a flourishing condition.

May 10th, accompanied by R.E. Comps, James Vroom and A. H. Hiltz; V.E. Comps. Dr. A. W. G. Good, District Grand Superintendent, H. E. Hieatt, Grand Pursuivant, and J. E. Bates; Ex. Comps. Dr. W. H. Laughlin, W. S. Poole, R. R. Bateman, Frank H. Barton and Claude J. McDonald, I visited St. Stephen Chapter, No. 6. We were cordially received by the Excellent 1st Principal G. E. Hollington and the Companions. The Mark Master Degree was beautifully and correctly exemplified under the new ritual. The work showed attentive preparation by the officers and augurs well for the success of St. Stephen Chapter with the new ritual.

May 12th, accompanied by R. Ex. Comps. Harry W. Wilson, V. Ex. Comps. Dr. A. W. G. Good, District Grand Superintendent, and J. Walter McFarlane; Ex. Comps. Austin Dunphy, S. A. Limerick and T. E. Sutherland, I visited Fredericton Chapter, No. 2. After having been received and escorted to the East by the Excellent 1st Principal, Frank H. Barton, the Most Excellent Master Degree was conferred, under the new ritual, on two candidates, in a very perfect and impressive manner. The officers in this Chapter have held a rehearsal every week since early in December last and the results of their intensive preparation were shown in the conferring of this degree as well as the Mark Master Mason, which I had

the pleasure of witnessing in April, June 16th, accompanied by R.

June 16th, accompanied by R.E. Companion R. M. Gable, V.E. Comps. J. Walter McFarlane, Grand Captain of the Host, and J. Henry DeWitt, District Grand Superintendent, Ex. Comps. N. Franchetti, Malcolm Amos, A. D. McKinley and Reid Richards of Edmundston Chapter, G. J. Gabel, C. S. Currie and about thirty members of Fredericton Chapter, I visited Woodstock Chapter, We were very hospitably received by the Ex. 1st Principal, Robert W. Maxwell, Officers and Companions. The Most Excellent Master Degree was exemplified in a very creditable manner. This Chapter has not, as yet, commenced work under the new ritual, but are preparing to do so immediately after the summer vacation.

On October 20th last, I accompanied about forty Companions of Fredericton Chapter on a fraternal visit to Aroostook Chapter, Houlton, Maine. After enjoying a very bountiful banquet, we repaired to the Chapter room, where the Most Excellent Master and Royal Arch Degrees were conferred in a very impressive manner. I had the pleasure, on this occasion, to extend to our friends and Companions in Aroostook Chapter the fraternal greetings from their Companions in New Brunswick.

I had the pleasure and good fortune to pay an official visit to every Chapter in our jurisdiction. In all cases we were royally entertained at the festive board, the Officers and Companions proving to be admirable hosts, and I thank these Companions for their hospitality and cordiality that was manifested, at all times, on these visits. These social hours and visits will linger long in my memory as the outstanding pleasures of my year in

office.

I found all Chapters doing energetic work, and, with the exception of two, making wonderful progress with the new ritual. The two Chapters referred to will have the new work well under way at the commencement of the new year.

The books of the Secretaries were all kept in splendid condition, and peace and harmony prevails throughout the

whole jurisdiction.

From the M.E. First Grand Principal of the Grand Chapter of Canada (Ontario) to attend their Annual Convocation of Hamilton in February last.

Gillis, who is well known in Chapter circles in New Brunswick, to attend their one hundred and seventh Annual Convocation at Portland on May 3rd and 4th last.
