SEVENTIETH ANNUAL CONYOCATION HELD IN THE CITY OF SAINT JOHN, JUNE 27th, A.D. 1957, A.J. 2487

In Grand Chapter

THE Grand Royal Arch Chapter of New Brunswick assembled in the Seventieth Annual Convocation at the Masonic Temple, in the City of Saint John, on Thursday, the twenty-seventh day of June.

The Most Excellent First Grand Principal and Grand Chapter Officers entered and assumed their respective stations.

Grand Chapter was duly declared open in Ample Form at nine forty-five in the morning. Most Excellent Hurd F. Reynolds, First Grand Principal, presided.

The Grand Scribe E. reported that there were a sufficient number of Chapters (all but one) represented to carry on the proceedings of Grand Chapter.

The opening Prayer of Grand Chapter was given by the V.Ex. Grand Chaptain:—

On motion, duly seconded and carried, invitation was received and laid on the table to be dealt with later on in the proceedings.

Clyde French, Past Grand High Priest, all of the Grand Chapter of Maine, were admitted, accompanied and introduced by M.E. James S. Hoyt. These distinguished guests were graciously received by M.E. Grand Z. Reynolds and invited to take seats in the East.

Most Worshipful Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick F. & A. M., Dr. Donald A. Somerville, Past Grand Z., was then admitted, accompanied by M.E. J. W. Donean, Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, who introduced our Grand Master. He was graciously received by M.E. Grand Z. Reynolds and invited to take a scat in the East. {Grand Honours}.

M.E. Roger W. Staples and Most Worshipful Grand Master Dr. D. A. Somerville, on being called on at this time, made short addresses which were received with loud applause.

GRAND CHAPTER DEVOTIONS

Diving Service was conducted by Very Excellent Companion Rev. Karl F. Drew, Grand Chaplain, as follows:—

Prayer of Invocation:—Supreme Architect of the universe, maker of heaven and earth, in Whom we live, move and have our being, grant unto us, we beseech Thee, Thy presence to our Convocation. Thou art the light of those that seek Thee, the life of these that find Thee. Let our present astembly be established to Thy honour. Endue its Officers with wisdom to discern, fidelity to their obligations, ever mindful of their duty to God and their fellowmen and exemplifying Thy love and beneficence to mankind.

Lord's Prayer in unison.

Hymn-"Unto the Hills."

Unto the bills around do I lift up my longing eyes

O whence for me shall my salvation come, from whence arise?

From God the Lord doth name my certain aid,

From God the Lord Who beaven and earth hath made.

He will not suffer that Thy foot be moved; safe shall thou be. No coreless shumber shall His cyclids close. Who keepeth thee. Behold, He sleepeth not, He slumbereth ne'er, Who keepeth Israel in His holy care.

Jehovah is Himself thy kneper true, thy changeless shade; Jehovah thy defence on thy right hand Himself hath made. And thee no sun by day shall ever smite; No moon shall harm thee in the silent night.

From every evil shall He keep thy soul, from every sin; Jehovah shall preserve thy going out, the coming in. Above thee watching, He whom we adore Shall keep thee beneeforth, yea, for eventore. Prayer of Consecration:—O Lord, in Whose hands are life and death, by Whose power we are sustained, and by Whose mercy we are spared, we would remember, at this time, our Companions who have been called to higher service in the Heavenly Tabernacle. We thank Thee that the stone which the builders rejected has become the head stone of the corner and that we, as living stones, are builded together with the chief corner stone into a spiritual house for a habitation of God in the spirit. Prepare us daily that we may be better fitted to be clothed upon of that immortality that cometh from above. Amen.

The Address:

But in a great house there are not only vessels of gold and silver, but also of wood and earth; and some to honour and some to dishonour. If a man therefore purge himself from these, he shall be a vessel unto honour, searchind and meet for the Master's use, and prepared unto every good work. (2 Timothy 2: 19, 20).

The Apostles, like all good Jews, were familiar with the Temple at Jerusalem, the great house with all its vessels of many kinds, qualities and purposes. How each one was used in the service of God. With this in mind and with true New Testament emphasis on the place of the individual in the new Christian teaching, Paul, writing to Timothy, likens each of us to vessels in the service of God's house. In this service God requires not only vessels of gold and silver but also of wood and earth. In the Craft, as well as in everyday society, we see these vessels. Gold and silver representing those placed in authority, who sit in the scats of honour, power and wealth. But beautiful and costly as gold and silver vessels are, however, ordinary plain wooden and earthen vessels are more useful. For to be useful is more to the world than beauty and brilliance. The ordinary wooden and earthen cop is in use about every hour of the day ministering, healing, giving comfort to the fevered line, refreshing the weary and hungry an deheering the aged and inficio.

Too often, as wood and earthen vessels, we are jealous of the vessels of gold and silver. And yet there is no room for jealousy. Let not the vessels of wood and earth despise themselves for they are more to the Lord, because more to the world, than vessels of gold and silver. Both are needed in the service of God's house and each has its distinctive function to perform in God's service. They therefore stand on equal footing and neither should hoast over the other. Let us be glad that we can, at least, be a vessel of some sort in the palace of the King and in His temple. That, in so far as we serve Him, we are worthy of honour and will receive honour at His hands,

But Paul tells us, in our text, that although vessels of gold, silver, wood and earth were created to serve God some are used to honour and some to dishonour.

Too many people believe, to be a vessel of honour, one must be a vestel of gold or silver. That our natural endowments, talents, circumstances and birthrights determine what kind of vessel we are. While we recognize the superiority of the material out of which we are created and that not all people have the same natural endowments and that it is not for common clay to assume to be gold or wood to be silver yet a lowly position is not necessarily a position of dishonour any more than a high position is therefore one of honour. To serve anywhere is honourable, To serve ill and poorly anywhere is dishonourable especially. if that position is one of influence, trust and power. For this soul and body of ours is a Divine handiwork most marvellously designed by the Greator. That the Maker intends you for a high and holy place in His house must be clear. to you.

What makes us vestels of dishonour?

(a) Being an empty vessel.

You know how soon even pure gold and silver grows dim, tarnishes and loses its brilliance and fills with dust when allowed to stay empty, unusued and idle. Let your williant talents, your splendid natural endowments, your noble powers lie dormant and they will soon be dishonoured. The Lord can do nothing with the idle vessel even though it he made of the finest of metals.

A gold sovereign carried in a man's pocket among cents, scraps of tobacco and such other things as gather there,

after awhile may get coated and lose its identity and pass for a cent. The story is told of a church treasurer whose curiosity was aroused by a coin which at first appeared to be a cent but on closer examination attracted his attention. After considerable rubbing and cleaning to find out its real character it proved to be a \$5.00 gold piece. The gold piece, through getting into bad company and fraternizing with cents and cheap rubbish had lost its character and worth and was going about cheapened and dishonoured. So it is with men and women, the vessels of the Lord's own making.

(b) The vessel being improperly used.

We become vessels of dishonour by what we eat, drink, hear, see, and believe. Paul writing to the Corinthians states that we are the Temple of God and that God dwelleth in us and our body is therefore holy and not to be defiled. This defilement is not determined by the nature of the vessel or cup. Whether it be gold, silver, wood or earth it may hold either healing medicine for the sick, food for the hungry, cool water for the thirsty, the oil and wine of consecration for sacred uses and thus be a vessel of honour or it may hold poison which destroys the person and all others about him and thus becomes a vessel of dishonour.

What makes us vessels of honour.

"If a man purge himself from these, he shall be a vessel unto honour, sanctified, and meet for the Master's use and prepared unto every good work."

The gold and silver, out of which the vessels of the Lord's house are made, are not found in a pure state but are mixed with impurities. They must be quarried and purified before they can be converted into vessels of honour.

We see the apostle Peter, unquarried, a rough gem in its native state, purged and fashioned by the great Architect and Creator, into a vessel of honour meet for the Master's use. Likewise Paul, who has given us our text, has experienced, in his own body, that purging and fashioning from Saul of Tarsus to Paul the Apostle. He tells us before God can take any vessel for service in His house it must be made meet for His service. It must be made clean and

purged. It is not asked if it is gold, silver, wood or earthen for the most important qualification is so be clean, washed out, purged of uncleanliness, sin. The vessel of honour must be sanctified, set apart for a sacred use, consecrated before it is meet and fit for the Masser's use. Let us be willing to be taught, to be purged by being put through the fire, to be hammered into obedience and slowly polished into beauty until we are right for service for Him and prepared for every good work.

"God Save the Queen."

On motion, duly seconded, resolved that the thanks of Grand Chapter be extended to the V.E. Grand Chaptain for his inspiring address and that he be requested to furnish the Grand Scribe E. with a copy of the address to be entered in the Proceedings. Rev. V.E. Drew, on being tendered the thanks of Grand Chapter by M.E. Grand Z. Reynolds, replied that it had been a great pleasure to conduct this service and would see that a copy of the address was delivered to the Grand Scribe E.

On motion of M.E. J. S. Hoyt, seconded by V.E. K. F. Drew, resolved that as the Minutes of the Sixty-ninth Annual Convocation had been printed and distributed, they be taken as read.

REPORTS OF GRAND SUPERINTENDENTS

DISTRICT No. 1

To the Most Excellent First Crand Principal, Royal Arch Chapter of New Brunswick:

I respectively submit my report as your Grand District Superintendent for District No. 1 for the year 1956-57.

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

M.E. First Grand Principal, Officers and Componions of the Grand Royal Arch Chapter of New Brunswick:

On behalf of the Executive Committee, I beg leave to submit the following report:—

Two meetings were held during the year in the Library of the Masonic Temple, Saint John, N. B.

The first of these took place on November 22nd, 1956, at 8:00 p.m., with ten members present, and the President presiding.

The Minutes of the regular meeting held April 6th, 1956, were read, and on motion, confirmed.

Bills to the amount of \$1,010.07 were presented for payment, and on motion, payment was approved.

The Grand Scribe E. read a letter from the Grand Chapter of Nova Scotia Grand Secretary further re waivers to Cumberland Chapter at Amherst on possible petitions from the Sackville area, and asking for our decision. This decision had been withheld pending the outcome of an investigation of the possibility of organizing a Chapter at Sackville. M.E. Grand Z. reported that he and V.E. Grand Superintendent Mellish had made an investigation, and had been assured of a sufficient number (nine) who would sign a petition for a dispensation, and that such petition could be expected shortly.

Mount Lebanon Chapter was brought up for discussion, and V.E. Grand Superintendent Mellish reported that he

had been endeavouring to arrange with that Chapter to make them an official visit, and that after having made the visit he would report his finding to this committee.

There being no further business, on motion, the meeting was adjourned.

The second meeting was held on Friday, April 26th, 1957, at 8:00 p.m., with seven members present, and the President presiding.

The Minutes of the regular receing held November 22nd, 1956, were read, and on motion, confirmed.

Payment of bills to the amount of \$78.30 was on motion, approved.

The Grand Scribe E, read a letter from Mount Lebanon Chapter enquiring re 25-year jewel to be presented to P. Z.s of 25 years standing. He brought to the attention of your committee that in the Manual of Grand Chapter of Canada, 1949, adopted at our Annual Convocation at Edmundston in 1950, appears three Sections on page 25; No. 1—25-year jewel to P. Z.s who completed 25 years since being installed; No. 2—50-year jewel to Companions of 50 years' standing; No. 3—Distinguished service medal—for distinguished service to Capitalar Masonry.

After considerable discussion it was moved by R.E. P. C. Wright, seconded by M.E. H. F. Reynolds, and carried, that we recommend to Grand Chapter that the Section relating to 50-year jewels for R. A. members of 50 years' membership be implemented at once, but that the Sections relating to 25-year jewels, and distinguished service models, be deleted from the Manual, at least for the present.

Further to the business of the organization of a Chapter at Sackville, the Grand Scribe E, reported that on April 15th, as per his arrangement, he, together with Grand District Superintendent Mellish, P.G.Z. W. V. Spencer, and Grand J. J. A. Gorveatte, met with seven Royal Arch Masons of Sackville, at his soe's home. Grand Superintendent Mellish presided and outlined just what a Royal Arch Chapter would mean in that area, and its advantages, and conducted a question period. It appeared that all Companions were truly interested in the formation of a Chapter, but

none felt that he could give the time required of those accepting office. Pinally, one of the Companions said that he would make a survey of prospective candidates in the Sackville-Dorchester-Port Elgin area and report his findings to our Grand Stribe E. as soon as possible.

An Audit committee composed of R.E. S. W. Sheppard and Ex. Comp. E. R. Capson, both of Union Chapter, was appointed by the President.

Grand Scribe E, reported that he had arranged for a Credentials Committee. This report was adopted,

On motion of M.E. C. L. Jenkins, seconded by R.E. S. W. Sheppard, and carried, Grand Scribe E. was directed to write Carleton Chapter requesting them to act as hosts to Grand Chapter on June 27th at the Annual Convocation, and to arrange for functions, banquer, and possibly some form of entertainment in the late afternoon; also that Grand Chapter contribute \$125.00 to assist in defraying expenses.

It was agreed that the Proclamation be issued in the same form as last year, and that proper changes be made by Grand Scribe E.

Arrangements for a guest speaker were left in the hands of Grand Z, and Grand Stribe E. The oxual invitations to Grand Chapters were ordered to be sent, also an invitation to His Worship the Mayor of Saint John, Comp. W. W. Macaulay.

The President expressed his thanks to Grand Scribe E, and the members of the Executive for assistance in carrying on the work of this Committee.

There bring no further business the meeting, on motion, adjourned.

Later in the evening a social hour was held in the hotel at which time I met many of the Companions and conversed with them. The sessions were very instructive and I was very glad to be able to represent New Brunswick at this Grand Chapter.

REPORT OF CONFERENCE ON GRAND ROYAL ARCH CHAPTER OF CANADA

June 27th, 1957.

Most Excellent First Grand Principal and Officers and Members of the Crand Lodge of New Brunswick:

In making my report to you, as your representative to the Teuth Conference of Grand Chapters of Royal Arch Masons in Canada, held in Regina, August 14 and 15, 1956, it afforded me much pleasure to serve you in this capacity, as the Conference was a very successful one, and everyone present was very keenly interested in all that went on during the time it was in session.

All of these papers were very well presented and dealt with problems with which all Grand Chapters and local Chapters are faced with. In the discussions that followed each, many helpful suggestions were offered, which, I am sure, all members of the Conference were impressed with.

All provinces, with the exception of Ontario, were officially represented, and from Ontario there was present, and took part in many of the discussions, Most Ex. Comp. C. M. Fitts, who was elected as Secretary Tweasurer for the coming year.

A number of vital points were discussed for presentation to individual Grand Chapters and local Grand Chapters. The principal one which the writer felt was of vital importance to this Grand Chapter being that of attendance of the local bodies.

It seems that right across the country, there is a definite lack of attendance at all of the meetings, which is cause of concern to all of the Grand bodies, and for which the responsibility clearly rests upon the officers of each Chapter. It is there that efforts must be made to create new enthusiasm and interest to keep the life of the Chapter continually active and progressive.

The second vital thought is that of the organization of such bodies known to us in Masonic circles, as the York Rite bodies, in an endeavour to tie them into a unit, yet keep their own individuality, in order that the bodies along with the Blue Lodge, can prosper and flourish.

These two points, wherever possible, should be thoroughly discussed and acted upon by all local Chapters.

The main business of the Conference was carried on in its usual manner, with the report of the nominating committee, of officers for the ensuing year, accepted, duly installed and all members remaining until the Conference had closed.

Again I express my appreciation for being your representative at this Grand Conference, and believe that representatives should be changed from time to time, in order to have new ideas, new thoughts and new enthusiasm in this Conference of Grand Chapters.






