OF MONCTON, JUNE 28th, A.D. 1962, A.L. 2492

In Grand Chapter

AMERICA, MY COUNTRY 'TIS OF THEE.

A CALL TO LIGHT

*"Awake, thou that sleepest, and arise from the dead,
and Christ shall shine upon thee."—Eph. 5: 14.*

Without light man is in darkness. The progress of knowledge has been such in these more recent years that many of the old assumptions of life are now called into question.

The place of man in creation has been debated most freely, and the external influences of life and their bearing upon conduct have been discussed with outspoken candour.

Our very existence and final destiny have been examined with searching criticism of abstract science.

This is right, so far as it goes, and we ought to be ready to welcome anything which tests our faith and our belief in God.

One thing seems to have emerged from these critical examinations, and that is the fact that of itself nature has

no answer to the problems raised, and no help in reaching any solution. Science seems to say: "Here are the results of our efforts to diagnose the trouble; you must now make the best of it."

That is rather like viewing a house shattered by an earthquake, with the householder sat in the midst surveying the ruins in hopeless despair, and giving him no help of a practical kind towards reconstruction.

The Christian Church has a different answer to the problem.

(1) *Christ, the Light*

Although we are encompassed in mystery, we know that there is a point of light in the darkness, Christ has come to tell us once for all that we are not orphans and castaways driven about on the boundless seas of time.

He came to reveal God to us as our loving heavenly Father.

We know that Christ came to this earth, also that He died and rose again.

His resurrection has altered not only the course, but the aspects of the world and human life. Our refuge — our only refuge — from the agonizing mysteries of the world, is in His empty tomb.

We know that He Who has all power in heaven and earth has promised to be with us throughout our days on earth while we struggle with the questions and trials of life.

We have Him as a present help, for He reaches out of the spirit realm into which He ascended, so as to give us His aid.

Is it not clear, that Freemasonry, with all its wealth of ritualism and its warmth of brotherhood arose because men yearned for that which had been effectually stamped out of their religion, that the Masonic Order spread so rapidly among them?

In theory the Masonic ritual embraces bodily worship of

the Incarnate Son of God, as did the earlier worship of the Church.

Its symbols have the same foundation as the symbols of Catholic ceremonial.

Today the Masons have the ritual — and the men.

And the Church has the reality for which the ritual stands —and in the great majority of our Churches the Eucharist is celebrated before empty pews.

Does it not seem incredible that educated Churchmen not only acquiesce in the condition, but glory in it?

And is it not the height of absurd inconsistency that Masons themselves are often among the most intolerant anti-ritualists in a parish.

Remember Companions! that God created the Church; Man created the Lodge.

God gave the sacraments as means of grace, in the interest of holy living, and these sacraments are reposed in the keeping of the Christian Church; man framed rules of life, which are expounded in the Lodge, but in which he is unable to give means whereby those rules are made effective.

(2) *The Light of the World*

There is a close relationship in this passage between its underlying thought and that of the Fourth Gospel.

Light is a word common to both St. John and St. Paul.

God is light: Christ is the light of the world.

Consequently, Christian Companions must walk in the light so that their light shows up the darkness.

"When it is shown up it ceases to be darkness and partaker of the nature of light.

"For whatsoever is made manifest is light. Moreover, light is essentially creative; evil is negative and barren."

(3) *A Call to the Light*

God calls all men, and women and children with them, into a brotherhood and a fellowship that exists because of

a common fatherhood; the Lodge creates a limited fraternity, extending to its own members alone and built on no common relationship between man and man.

God, the Great Architect, has made regeneration possible for His children by creation to become His children in a still higher sense; the Lodge cannot provide means whereby a man may be born again after he is old.

God sustains His children, in the Church, by a supernatural food through which His own divine life is extended to them; the Lodge can create conclaves and attend banquets, but it can provide no food for the strengthening and refreshing of the soul.

The Lodge reverences the Bible as the great light; but the Church is the author and interpreter of the Bible.

And herein is the distinction between a life of morality based only on teaching, and a life of spirituality based on the sacraments, clearly shown.

Masonry has produced good men, but no saints.

Among those who are Masons but not Churchmen we shall find no Sir Galahad, no Sir Percival, no Launcelot Andrewes, no Thomas Ken, no John Keble, no Pusey, no Gladstone, no Wilberforce, no Edward King. Until Knights Templar can obtain for their Order the holy grail, they cannot fulfill their own ambitions and ideals; and that they can only have when their conclaves center about a corporate Communion, when they restore to the Church the ritual which they took from it, and when they place the reality of the Body and Blood of Christ upon the altar before which they bend the knee.

St. Paul reminded his readers that at one time they were children of darkness but they were made children of light. Because of this, he issued his call to live in the light, as in our text.

This saying appears to be a quotation. Many scholars think that it is a fragment of an early Christian hymn, possibly a baptismal hymn. It may even be a hymn commemorating Christ's descent into the underworld. It is a call

to Christians, ourselves among them. "You, the new light, have your part to play in the conversion of darkness into light."

Right produces right; it rights wrong. Or as St. Paul prefers to say, "Light produces light; it lightens darkness."

We call upon Churchmen who are also Masons to demand that all that wealth of ceremonial which they find dignified and helpful in the Lodge, be restored also to their Churches. We would have them be, not worse Masons, but better Churchmen. We would have them, as Knights, find the holy grail.

*"When the day hath light, let the light be used,
For no man can the light control."*

*Go forth! Go forth and be a master true,
A builder of the temple all divine,
Hire to the master-life sublime and through,
Earth's darkness let light immortal shine,
The light invisible—that secretly reveals
The inner being which the visible conceals.*

*Three in one, and one in three,
Ruler of the earth and sea
Hear us, while we lift to Thee
Holy chant and psalm.*

*Light of lights! with morning shine
Lift on us thy light divine;
And let charity benign
Breathe on us her balm.*

*Light of lights! when falls the even,
Let it close on sin forgiven;
Fold us in the peace of heaven;
Shed a holy calm.*

Moved by R.E. M. F. Eagles, seconded by R.E. W. Y. Leeman, and resolved that a vote of thanks be extended to Canon Franchetti for carrying out this Service and delivering his inspiring address, copy of same to be handed to

Grand Scribe E. and printed in the Proceedings. M.E. Grand Z. Lewis extended our grateful thanks to the V.E. Grand Chaplain, who in turn thanked Grand Chapter for the kind motion and stated that manifest of address had been given to Grand Scribe E.

At this time representative appointed by his Worship Mayor Rideout, Alderman V. E. Harvey, accompanied by Ex. J. Russell Dickie, was admitted, escorted to the East and welcomed by the M.Ex. Grand Z. Lewis. Alderman Harvey, in a few remarks, welcomed our Grand Chapter to Moncton, stating his pleasure at being present, trusting that we would have a most pleasant stay in his fair city, and a very successful Seventy-fifth Annual Convocation. The thanks of Grand Z. extended and loud applause by Grand Chapter.

We sincerely welcome you with the prayer and hope — that you will find spiritual, temporal and fraternal pleasure and benefit from the association and happenings of this day.

To the distinguished visitors from other Jurisdictions, we especially welcome you. Your presence is proof of the close fraternal association maintained in Capitular Masonry. We earnestly hope your sojourn with us will be very pleasant and that you may carry away with you the sincere feeling that it has been well to have been here.

It is with regret that we learn that owing to unexpected demands on his time, it is impossible for His Worship, Mayor and Companion Rideout to be personally present this morning. To his able representative, Alderman Harvey, who has spared time from his busy itinerary to extend to us a civic welcome to this progressive city we say "Thank You" for your warm and kindly welcome.

One of my first obligations is to extend my heartfelt thanks to the Companions who, one year ago, paid me the compliment of election to the high office of First Grand Principal, which office I accepted with humility and misgivings. I trust that you have not regretted your choice. I have had before me as a guiding mark, the high standard of service rendered by my predecessors, which has been both guide and stimulation. To my successor I pledge my earnest help and co-operation at all times.

My first official appearance in my new office was also one of the most pleasant. This was in attendance at the Annual Convocation of the Grand Chapter Royal Arch Masons of Nova Scotia, held at Wolfville, N. S., on June 24th last year, to attend which I was honored with an invitation. At this Convocation I was further honored by being presented with "The Joseph Conway Brown Medallion," a medal struck by that Grand Chapter in honor of the per-

sonage of that name who was largely instrumental in organizing that Grand Body, and was its first Grand Scribe. At that time I was also invited to join their class of candidates for the "Order of High Priesthood," which I was most pleased to accept. A highlight of the proceedings of that Convocation was a panel discussion on the question "Is the Past Masters Degree necessary to serve any purpose in the line of the degrees of the Capitular Rite as presented and practised under the Ritual of this (N. S.) Grand Chapter?" The panelists chosen were: M.Ex. Companions Percy S. Cochrane, Senator Fred Blois and Sidney Burrill, who are all well known to most of the Ex. Companions of this Jurisdiction. This was a most interesting and instructive discussion but under the circumstances I would not feel free to divulge the conclusions for publication in this Jurisdiction. At this time I was also honored by being officially received by the Grand Council Royal & Select Masters of the Eastern Jurisdiction of Canada, which body was also in annual assembly at that time and location.

As you are quite aware, my general health has been far from good during the past year or more, which has had some bearing on my fraternal activities, notwithstanding which I have managed to visit, with one exception, all the Chapters within the Jurisdiction. The omission was, most unfortunately, the junior Chapter, "The Roy E. Crawford" Chapter No. 13, located at Sackville. Crawford, could not be present, owing to some unexpected call to duty at the University, too late for a replacement to be arranged.

I would be quite remiss if I failed at this time to convey to Very Excellent Grand Chaplain, Rev. Canon Franchetti, our very warm and hearty thanks for the fine presentation of the service of the morning and coupled with this my per-

sonal thanks and appreciation for the services of his office during the year. May the good Lord spare him to us for many years, is our constant and earnest prayer.

By-Laws

Revised portions of the By-Laws of Housford Chapter No. 7, raising "Joining Fee" and "Dues" were given sanction and approval.

Visitations

At most of the visitations I have been ably supported by the attendance and care of the Grand Director of Ceremonies, V.Ex. Comp. R. J. Coy. In fact it would have been quite impossible for me to make the long trip to the Chapters in the north of the Province without his sustaining help. As it was we were able to do this with very little (one only) disruption of dates. I could not pass over this visitation without mention of the vacancy in the ranks there caused by the absence of my particularly esteemed friend and our late Companion, "Job" Steven.

Our Official Visitation at Fredericton No. 2, on the evening of November 9th was a real "highlight," the acting Grand "Hagga!" on this occasion, M.Ex. Comp. H. Ralph Gunter, being our sole surviving Past Grand High Priest, under the so-called "Old Ritual" (which should actually be designated the "New") and the first or senior "Most Excellent First Grand Principal" after the adoption of our present ritual. Also on this occasion we were honored and delighted to have in the escort line of Officers eight Past M. Ex. First

Following a sumptuous supper served by the efficient catering staff of the Fredericton Masons, Chapter was opened and Grand Chapter received. After exchange of courtesies, the Fredericton Chapter Officers assumed their stations and in their usual efficient and impressive manner conferred the "Supreme Degree of the Holy Royal Arch" on a class of fourteen candidate Most Ex. Masters in waiting. Altogether this was an "event" rather than a mere "visitation" and will ever remain in our memory as such.

On January 18th we officially visited at Walton Chapter No. 12, Salisbury, and installed the Officers, being ably assisted by the V.Ex. Grand Director of Ceremonies Coy, Rt. Ex. M. F. Eagles, Grand J, M.Ex. Companions Spencer and Colpitts, R.Ex. Comp. S. J. Horton and other Ex. Comps. of Walton and Botsford Chapters. A very fine banquet supper concluded the evening's program.

The following night, January 19th, we officially visited Carleton Chapter No. 1, and were pleased to be guests at their Installation of Officers which was so efficiently conducted by M. Ex. Comp. Thos. G. Ballantyne. On this occasion I was accompanied by the ever faithful Grand Director Coy, R.Ex. Comp. M. F. Eagles, Grand J., R.Ex. Comp. S. J. Horton, Hon. Past Grand Scribe E., M.Ex. Comps. Spencer and Gorveatte, and Ex. Comp. A. E. Horsman of Botsford Chapter. As at Fredericton, a supper banquet preceded the ceremony and also on this occasion I was pleased to be afforded opportunity of presenting the 50-Year Jewel to Comp. H. W. Jones, he being a resident of Saint John although a member of Botsford Chapter.

On January 27th I officially visited my home Chapter, Botsford No. 7. This was an afternoon emergent Convocation for the Installation of Officers for the year. At this visitation and in the installation I was assisted and escorted by the First and Second Grand Principals, M.Ex. Comps.

State of the Craft

From observation and extensive inquiry during the past year it would appear that Capitular Masonry in this Jurisdiction, is on a solid footing and generally regarded with high appreciation by the Companions of the Royal Craft and with respect by those outside the "Inner Circle." We always have had and will have those who use the "Chapter" as a means to an end, in their climb up the ladder toward a more or less illusionary goal, never stopping to consider the solidity and permanence of the "step" by which they ascend. These fail to see the beauty or to appreciate the true value of the more than brotherly companionship to be found within the Chapter. From these we get material gain only, the "fees" and "dues." Let these pass along. Our purpose should be to—

1st. Choose members carefully, striving for quality rather than quantity;

2nd. Confer the Degrees in the impressive manner they

deserve by reason of the symbolical lessons to be derived from them;

3rd. Use particular care in electing and appointing Officers, choosing only those whom one is certain is sincere in the purpose of best serving the interests of his Chapter;

4th. Stimulate attendance. This last might seem to be the biggest problem of them all, in this and all other Masonic, or other fraternal bodies. The summary seems to be: Too many "joiners" and too few "workers." It might also seem that the Grand District Superintendents should give consideration, or means provided whereby they can give joint consideration and action to stimulate interest and attendance, working in conjunction with the Ex. First Principals of the individual Chapters. We hope to see a move made at this Convocation, to that end.

Now it is time to bring this rambling report to an end. Again I thank you for the privilege and honor of serving you, and it is indeed sorry I am that I could not have done a better job. I humbly ask you to overlook and condone my faults and omissions and to remember me with tolerance and forbearance. I cannot truthfully say that I have done all that I might have, but only this: *I have tried.*

To my successor to be, I extend my heartiest congratulations, with my pledge of help and co-operation to the extent of my health, strength and ability, and my sincere wish and prayer is that this Grand Chapter may be, and ever continue to be a strong factor for good in our land.

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

To the Most Excellent First Grand Principal, Officers and Excellent Companions of the Grand Royal Arch Chapter of New Brunswick:

As the President of your Executive Committee, I herewith submit my report for the past year's activities.

During the past year the Executive Committee held three meetings in the library of the Masonic Temple, Germain Street, Saint John, N. B.

Steven, a vacancy was thus created in our Grand Representatives, namely New Zealand. The Most Ex. E. E. Lewis directed the Grand Scribe E. to advise New Zealand of the nomination of Ex. Comp. A. B. McKinnon as the replacement.

On motion duly moved and seconded, bills to the amount of \$1,184.91 were passed for payment.

The Most Excellent First Grand Principal appointed the M. Ex. Comp. James S. Hoyt as the official delegate to attend the Conference of Grand Chapters of Canada being held at Belleville, Ontario, in August. M. Ex. Comp. Langel brought up the possibility of presenting a Past Grand Z. jewel to all Past First Grand Principals; it was decided by your committee that Grand Chapter could not stand this heavy an expenditure at this time and that this matter be set aside for the present time.

As 1962 will be our Grand Chapter's 75th Anniversary, the R. Ex. President appointed M. Ex. Comp. E. E. Lewis and M. Ex. Comp. Sid Sheppard as a committee to make inquiries and report back, as to the possibility of souvenirs for that occasion.

The Grand Scribe E. advised this meeting that our Most Excellent Comp., the Rev. D. C. MacKenzie would be leaving this Jurisdiction in the near future, your committee thought that, for his unending devotion and untiring zeal to this Grand Chapter, that something be done to send him on his way with our best wishes. It was thought that a contributory dinner and gift would be most suitable. The R. Ex. President then appointed a committee to make all the necessary arrangements for a dinner and procure an appropriate gift.

There being no further business, this meeting adjourned at 9:30 p.m.

The second meeting was called to order on January 12, 1962, at 8:00 p.m., by the President, with nine Excellent Companions present. Minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed. The M. Ex. This motion was seconded by M. Ex. Comp. Ballantyne, and carried unanimously by your committee. There being no other business this meeting adjourned.

The third meeting was held April 12th, 1962. The meeting was called to order by the President at 8:30 p.m.; before this meeting was called to order the M. Ex. First Grand Principal E. E. Lewis presented a 50-Year Jewel to Comp. Arthur C. Burk who was exalted in Carleton Chapter No. 1, on the 11th day of December, 1911. Comp. Burk, in a few well chosen words, stated his pleasure and thanks in receiving this jewel and then retired. There were nine Excellent Companions present for this meeting, M. Ex. Comp. Wright acted as secretary for this meeting as the Grand Scribe E. was in ill health on this date. Minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed. A letter was read from Ex. Comp. A. B. McKinnon acknowledging receipt of his Commission as Grand Representative of New Zealand.

On motion, bills to the amount of \$571.24 were passed for payment.

Souvenirs for the 75th Anniversary were discussed and several samples were shown. It was then moved and seconded that 100 desk pads and 100 lapel pins with plastic card and Keystone be purchased and presented to the Companions at the registration desk of our next Annual Convocation. M. Ex. Comp. Sid Sheppard and Ex. Comp. R. D. Munro were appointed as the audit committee.

The following money grants were passed for the next Annual Convocation being held in Moncton on June 28th, 1962: \$125.00 to the Host Chapter; \$15.00 rental of quarters; \$5.00 for Outer Guard.

There being no further business this meeting adjourned at 10:00 p.m.

M.E. Rev. D. G. MacKenzie, P.G.Z., assisted by other P.G.Z.s, installed the elected and appointed Officers present.


